The greatest factor in learning to read and language development is early exposure to language. By reading to your child every day, you promote and build on your child's language and literacy skills. When you take time to read to your child, sitting them in your lap, holding them, allowing them to turn the pages, asking them questions about the story, you are instilling in them a love for reading. You are your child's first and most influential teacher, they are watching you and when you have a love for reading, they see that and often portray that in their everyday life. How many times has your child repeated what you were saying when you had no idea they were even listening? They are always watching, listening and learning what is important to you and that will be important to them. At Head Start, we promote reading to your child through our "Reading Program". We have an onsite library which has books available for check out or request access to books on your Learning Genie account. Remember to enter your daily reading log time into Learning Genie. We also work with our local library in Spencer and ensure that each one of you has a library card that enables you to check out books. You are preparing them for kindergarten when you help them listen for sounds of the letters making the words. Children need to hear the sounds of the letters to establish strong reading skills. Don't forget to review letter sounds using Zoo-phonics at https://zoo-phonics.com to strengthen early literacy skills. You are preparing them for their "transition" to kindergarten and establishing excellent "school readiness" skills. READ! READ! READ!

baked pumpkin oatmeal bars

Ingredients:


2 cups oats 1 cup canned pumpkin ¼ cup honey 1½ teaspoons ground cinnamon ¼ cup mini chocolate chips

Instructions:

- Spray an 8 inch by 8 inch square baking dish with cooking spray. Preheat the oven to 350°F.
- Combine all ingredients in a mixing bowl. Stir well. Press into the baking dish.
- Bake for 18 to 20 minutes until the top is golden and firm.
- 4. Let cool, Slice into 9 bars.
- Store in an airtight container for up to 3 days.

Paper Pumpkin

Materials Needed:

- Orange Construction Paper
- Black Marker
- Glue
- Scissors
- Ruler

Directions:

- Fold A piece of orange construction paper in half (lengthwise)
- Cut 2 inch slits, from the fold of the paper, the length of the paper (each slit should be made about 1/2 inch apart from each other)
- Unfold the paper and glue the ends together to make the pumpkin
- Draw 2 eyes, a nose, and a mouth on the paper using a marker to make a face for your pumpkin
- Cut a handle from orange construction paper and glue the ends to the inside of the pumpkin
